Admission: The whole admission process is conducted online, through the website www.pinglacollege.org. Merit list is prepared online to maintain complete transparency. The State Government and the Central Government reservation rules are maintained strictly. According to merit list admission is done and their testimonials are checked in person. No candidate needs to come to college until the time when testimonials are verified in person. The college has an MIS software named Smart college. This software runs from a central database in networked condition. Data generated from different computers are stored there. Accounting and financial transactions are managed by this software. In our library OPAC (Online

Public Access Catalogue) is available. Besides OPAC, search facilities are also available for students. SOUL software is currently active in library. The main website of our college is www.pinglacollege.org. It contains history of the college, various departments, details of teaching and nonteaching staff, the composition of the Governing Body, activities and minutes of IQAC, various facilities available for students. All kinds of notices and upcoming events are regularly posted on the website.

#### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Pingla Thana Mahavidyalaya is affiliated to Vidyasagar University. So the institution has to abide by the curriculum designed by Vidyasagar University. At the beginning of the academic session the Academic sub-committee of our college meets with all head of the departments. The Academic sub-committee discusses all academic matters including fixing up dates for internal assessment. The committee also evaluates the previous year's results. As per the decision of the Academic sub-committee, Routine sub-committee prepares class routine. Departmental meetings are held in every department for distribution of curriculum among the faculty members of the concerned department and other academic issues. The heads of the departments communicate the message of the college and decisions of the academic sub-committee and of the Routine sub - committee to the concerned faculty members. All the faculty members do the needful either with lecture, tutorial, coaching or organizing seminars to execute plans for effective implementation of the curriculum. Being an affiliated institution under Vidyasagar University, the college keeps contact with the updates of the curriculum and guidelines for both students and teachers. The head of the institution informs the concerned teachers and the faculty about the changes if occurred and hands it over to them. The university organizes workshops for framing syllabi, for effective implementation of the curriculum and co-curriculum for the faculty. The institution encourages its faculty members to participate actively in such programs. This year CBCS and semester system are introduced for the students of Honours in Science Departments. The college provides special classes for slow learners. Special classes are also conducted for those students who could not attend the classes on account of NCC camp or participation in the sports. Various teaching methods are applied to ensure effective delivery of the curriculum, namely, Chalk and board method, ICT enabled teaching-learning method, group discussion etc. Field works, projects works and educational excursions are organized by some departments. Students have opportunities to participate in the seminars. All proceedings of the meeting of the Academic sub-committee, Routine sub-committee and concerned department are recorded in the meeting books.

Best Practices 1: Rain water harvesting under "Jal Dharo Jal Bharo" project for eco friendly campus Context: Pingla Thana Mahavidyalaya is under the jurisdiction of Paschim Medinipur district. The major portion of this district covers dry area. Water is a big problem for cultivation. Drinking water is also a big problem in this area. Hence Rain water harvesting under "Jal Dharo Jal

Bharo" project for eco friendly campus can mitigate the problem to an extent. College had contacted Department of Water Resources Development Government of West Bengal in line of that with a view to helping surrounded area and that was then sanctioned by the Department of Water Resources Development Government of West Bengal. Rain water harvesting is a process in which precipitation that falls on a site like roof tops, parks, roads, open grounds etc. is diverted, captured and stored for future use, instead of allowing it to run off, evaporate or infiltrate into the soil (Ground water recharge). Application and practice: In our college campus rain water is captured from the roof catchments and stored in reservoirs. Depending on its intended use, the captured precipitation is treated at times. Evidence of success: Rain water harvesting under "Jal Dharo Jal Bharo" project helped to reduce the demand for imported water, thus promoting both water and energy conservation. Gardens and lawns thrived better under irrigation with harvested rainwater than before. Plus, appliances last longer when free from the corrosive or scale effects of hard tap water, since rain water has a nearly neutral pH and is free from disinfection by-products, salts, minerals, and other natural and man-made contaminants. This project helps the college to keep eco-friendly environment throughout the year. Best Practices 2: Displaying new books and journals arrival in the library for the benefit of the students Context: Library helps to construct the backbone of human civilization. It acts as the storehouse of knowledge and culture. At present, the Central Library of Pingla Thana Mahavidyalaya contains nearly 26085 books (text, reference, donated and rare). The Library has a Separate Section of journals and magazines. Application and Practice: The central library of our college practices display of newly arrived books and journals and offers lending facilities so as to increase the knowledge base of students in their subjects as well as in different genre. The growing interest of students brings them to search for new arrivals in the library. Evidence of success: Over the past few years, the practice of students to visit the Central Library, and lending books has increased significantly.
